From Wednesday 15 August through to Friday 17 August I had the very great pleasure of accompanying 39 of our wonderful Stage 3 students on our biannual trip to Canberra. After a very early start we reached Canberra around 11:30 to take a quick trip up to the lookout at Mount Ainslie. We then moved on to the Australian War Memorial where we learnt much about the efforts of our soldiers in a number of engagements. Then, it was off to Parliament House to role play the tabling of a bill in the House of Representatives. Savannah made a very fine Prime Minister and Elyse kept us all in line as per usual. A tour of Parliament House then followed where we were lucky enough to actually see both houses in action. It was a great opportunity for our students to witness what they had been studying in class over recent weeks. Their knowledge of the processes was very impressive.

On Day 2, after a very early breakfast, we were off to Tidbinbilla to visit the fascinating Canberra Deep Space Centre. Our trip there and back was highlighted by the abundance of wildlife out during daylight hours due to the drought. From here we were off to research the history of Australian democracy at Old Parliament House. Then we experienced the distributions involved in the election process at the Australian Electoral Education Centre. Next came the Australian Mint to find out how our currency has developed and witness some of the machines in action. One even danced for us! From here we moved on to our final activity for the day, the much anticipated Australian Institute of Sport, to witness some current and future stars in training and take on the many challenges of the student room.

Day 3 gave us another very early start to allow us to pack our belongings onto the coach then off to Government House, the home of the Governor General. We actually got to stand in his private study where new prime ministers are sworn in, and view the formal reception and dining rooms: a rare treat only available to very lucky schools. Lastly, off to QUESTACON which was thoroughly appreciated by all.

All in all, an epic three days much enjoyed by both staff and students. Outstanding behaviour and many laughs and memories to treasure always.
